Germany confirm semi-final appearance

The line-up for the men's semi-finals is complete after yet another dazzling day of action at the Olympic Green Hockey Stadium.

We can now confirm that Spain will meet Olympic Champions Australia with The Netherlands playing Germany. Both matches take place on Thursday evening – it should be an evening of great entertainment!

The evening matches yesterday saw Spain stay in the medal hunt by defeating Korea 2:1, with skilful forward Santi Freixa scoring a sparkling individual effort in the first half before sealing the deal with a second half penalty corner. The victory confirmed Spain as pool winners, leap-frogging Germany who also safely negotiated their way into the medal matches with a 3:1 triumph over New Zealand. Germany have had a slow start in this tournament but were firing on all cylinders in this one, as goals from captain Timo Wess, Matthias Witthaus and Florian Keller ensured the win.

The Netherlands came from a goal down to defeat Pakistan 4:2, which included Taeke Taekema's ninth and tenth goals at the Beijing 2008 Games. Australia claimed a 3:3 draw with Great Britain, with young midfield superstar Eddie Ockenden scoring an equaliser three minutes from time. Had Australia won the game they would have been playing Germany instead of Spain in the semi-finals.

In yesterday's other matches, Canada defeated South Africa while Belgium took all three points against home favourites China in front of a packed stadium.

Hockey Celebrates 100 Years at the Olympic Games

Every day we travel back in time to celebrate a century of Olympic hockey.

Atlanta 1996: This was a big year for the Dutch men's team, who finally achieved Olympic Gold after years of just missing out.

The Netherlands – featuring youngsters Teun de Nooijer, Jeroen Delmee and Guus Vogels, all of whom are playing in Beijing 2008 – defeated surprise package Spain 3:1, thanks to strikes from Jan Floris Bovelander (2) and Bram Lomans.



The all-conquering Hockeyroos took Gold in the women's tournament, beating Korea 3:1 with strikes from Australia legends Alyson Annan (2) and Katrina Powell.

Women's Pool Phase – Facts and Figures

Ahead of the women's semi finals, here are some interesting statistics from the pool phase of the competition.

Goals per match: 116 goals have been scored in 30 matches so far at Beijing 2008. The average of 3.87 goals per match is higher than at any other Olympics.

Match with most goals: 9 goals were scored in the Pool A match between Australia and Korea (5:4). Only one match in Olympic history counted more goals. At Seoul 1988, Australia drew 5 all with Korea in a 10-goal-match.

Biggest Win: The Netherlands' 6-0 victory over South Africa is the biggest win so far at Beijing 2008. This six-goal winning margin equals the record for biggest win at the Olympics, which was last equalled at Sydney 2000 when Argentina beat New Zealand 7-1.

Top scorer: Maartje Paumen (NED) is the leading goalscorer with eight goals. She needs just one more goal to break the record for most goals in a single edition, which she now shares with Alyson Annan (AUS, 1996), Chang Eun-Jung (KOR, 1996), Lisanne Lejeune (NED, 1988) and Beth Anders (USA, 1984).

Fastest Goal: Keli Smith scored the fastest goal at Beijing 2008, by giving the United States a 1-0 lead after only 35 seconds in the match against New Zealand.

Field Goals: Agustina Soledad Garcia (ARG) has scored eight field goals at the Olympics. Rechelle Hawkes (AUS) is the only female player to have scored more goals from open play (11) in Olympic history.

Penalty Corner Goals Player: Maartje Paumen (NED) has broken the all-time Olympic record for most penalty corner goals. Paumen has now converted eight penalty corners. The previous record of seven was jointly held by Lisanne Lejeune (NED) and Franziska Hentschel (GER).

Milestone: On 12 August, Emily Halliday (AUS) scored the 600th goal in the history of the women's tournament at the Olympic Games.

Milestone: Casey Eastham's (AUS) match winning goal against Korea (5-4) on 10 August marked the 100th goals for the Hockeyroos at the Olympics.

Women's Semi-Finals Preview: Can anyone stop the Netherlands?

The semi-final stage of the Beijing 2008 hockey tournament is upon us, with two mouth-watering games at the Olympic Green Hockey Stadium. At 18:00, defending Olympic Champions Germany face host nation China in front of literally thousands of screaming fans. The following match will be equally high in quality, with tournament favourites and current world Champions The Netherlands coming up against 2008 Champions Trophy winners Argentina. These are two matches that you really do not want to miss!

Germany v China: These two sides last met competitively at the 2008 Champions Trophy in Germany, with the home team winning 2:0 on that day. However, China are now the team with the home advantage and it is clearly making a difference. Aside from a 4:1 loss to Argentina, Germany have been outstanding here in Beijing, but China look as though they are starting to believe that they are capable of winning this tournament.

The Netherlands v Argentina: The Netherlands are favourites for this match, but only a fool would under-estimate Argentina. If Las Leonas are to have any chance of winning they need to concede as few penalty corners as possible. Set piece expert Maartje Paumen is currently in lethal form, needing just one goal to break the record for number of goals scored in a single Olympic Games.

Four-time World Player of the Year Luciana Aymar will need to be at her imperious best to guide her side into the Olympic final.

Also taking place today is the classification match for 9th/10th place, with Korea taking on Japan at 08:30. Then, at 11:00, Spain will play the USA with the winner claiming a creditable seventh place finish at Beijing 2008.
